Current Book Project:

Fear the Metals: One Hundred Years of Gold and Platinum Dredging in the Colombian Chocó

This research traces a century of industrial mining in the Colombian Chocó, a densely forested Pacific Coast region marked by fast-flowing rivers and the presence of gold and platinum in riverbed gravels. It focuses on the arrival and departure of one highly-capitalized firm, known in Colombia as la Compañía Minera Chocó Pacífico but in New York first as SAGAP (South American Gold and Platinum) and later as IMC (International Mining Corporation). I reconstruct nine decades of interplay among local rights-holders, laborers, dredgemasters, regional officials, national politicians, local people, mining engineers, and stockholders from the 1870s to 1974, when the firm's assets were nationalized in a process that failed to benefit local people.
