9. Summary of Teaching

- Teaching: I began teaching while still in graduate school, at Rutgers-Newark NJ, 1980. After receiving my PhD I then taught in the Winterthur Program in Early American Studies (an MA program of the University of Delaware, 1982-1984), in American Studies and History at Boston University (1984-1988), and then in Folklore & Folklife (1989-1999) and History (1999-present) at the University of Pennsylvania. In each of these positions I have offered two courses per semester, on a wide variety of topics: Art History and Ethnography (1983), Material Life in Seventeenth-Century America (1984), American Vernacular Architecture (1985, 1987, 1991, 1998, 2006), Rituals of Death and Dying in America (1985, 1994), Folklife Studies (1985), 2009), Ethnography and Memory (1995, 2006, 2010), Witchcraft and Possession (2003, 2006, 2010), and Material Culture and Symbolic Exchange (2002, 2008).
